The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time: "When I was a child, I often thought of the Church as something mystical and supernatural. I wasn't wrong in my understanding of the Body of Christ, for surely the Church has these characteristics. However, even though we speak about the foundation of all we are as Church being the "mystery of Christ," Jesus became a man so that supernatural element could break into the natural world in a profound way. What we once could not see, we now see. What we saw as a God in a distant place now dwelt among us. It is one of the aspects of Catholicism that I have grown to appreciate the most as I have matured: for a Catholic, the supernatural is natural. The communion of saints is heavenly and earthly at the same time. The Beatitudes instruct us about this reality. Pope Francis reminds us that holiness is "not about swooning in mystic rapture." Holiness is about living in the real world and doing extraordinary things with our ordinary lives. Our stewardship way of life consists of actions in the natural world that have extraordinary repercussions. Do not ever take your simple actions of generosity and love for granted. As disciples called to a life of stewardship, we participate in something more profound than what we can see. We are blessed to be called to follow Jesus, and we bring blessing to all those with whom we choose to share ourselves.

Reflections of Our Past

The Tignon also spelled Tiyon Pronounced: tee-yon

Is a headdress worn by Creole women of African descent in Louisiana beginning in the Spanish colonial period. This was the result of **sumptuary slave laws** passed in 1786 under the administration of Governor Esteban Rodriguez Miró which enforced appropriate public dress for females of color in colonial society. These were times when black women weren't allowed to display their hair in public. One of their most standout physical



attributes that separated them form their white female counterparts. Women of African descent would often adorn their hair with colorful jewelry, beads and other accents demonstrating an exotic appearance which attracted the attention of white, French and Spanish creole men. Many of whom had become openly kept mistresses. This perceived threat to white women's relationships with French and Spanish creole men incited the jealousy and anger of their wives, mothers, sisters, daughters and fiancées. The social status of white women being threatened and the attention garnered as a result of the jewelry-adorned hairstyles from women of African descent led to the demand by white people for action. Governor Miró decreed that women of color (slaves or free) should cover their hair and heads with a knotted headdress and refrain form "excessive attention to dress" to maintain class distinctions.
