GOSPEL MEDITATION



"We like to think we are totally free, but the bitter truth is we simply are not. Or better put, our freedom is limited on every side — by governments, corporate giants, physical and mental frailties, genetic

shortcomings, and even the boundaries of time and space, and above all, the burden of our sins and pending deaths. In our day, we are perhaps particularly aware that we are not free to disconnect from the technocratic rulers of the air. If you doubt me, try not paying your internet bill and see what happens. We are not totally free.

It's nothing new, of course. In Jesus' day, everyone felt the crushing weight of the Roman Empire. You can say you're free all you want. But try not paying your taxes to Rome and see what happens.

Once we feel this burden in our own lives — however it comes — we are ready to hear the stunning announcement that commences Mark's gospel, "The beginning of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." It's not a simple perfunctory introduction, but a dramatic announcement of new freedom. The word "gospel" was a political, even military, term. It meant: a great victory has been won and a new king is in charge. This Jesus — not the Roman emperor — is God's son, and he has defeated all that crushes human freedom. It's time to follow him and be truly free. This week let's refuse to submit our freedom to false rulers — especially that of sin. And let's rejoice that Christ is coming to make us perfectly free from all our oppressors."



PASTORS CORNER

Mark 1: 1-8

The readings today mirror what our human conditions look like when we are away from "our root" that is when we depart from God.

Every single moment we are not in peace with God then we must be sure that we are in captivity. For some it lasts but a while because of their inner desire to return to the Lord while others have lost the taste of the Lord because they have found comfort in the warm arms of the world. It Pampers them, cuddles them, caresses them and whispers a sweet melody of lullaby to their ears till they are lost in slumber of sin in the snuggle of its arms.

Who will redeem the man sleeping in sin? Who will wake him up to the dawn of the salvation of the Lord? Who will quake off and break the shackles around him so that he will regain his freedom?

A voice has been given to us today. It sounds strongly in the wilderness of our lives. To hear it we must shut our ears from the voice of the world with its dictatorship of noise. It speaks at a devastating speed and volume in order to say nothing. It does not know how to be quiet. It rebels against a divine silence.

Advent calls us to rediscover our inner self through divine silence. There we will hear the voice that invites us to level the mountains and hills of our hearts. They are great obstacles that block our spiritual view. They must not maintain their height. They must be flattened so that the Lord can build himself in our hearts. This is a journey of rediscovering the "Eternal Beauty" God in the secret place of our hearts. It is a journey to freedom. The journey from slavery to freedom is one we need to travel in every moment. The Lord needs us back. He is no more far away. The cradle He needs to lay his New Born is in the Bethlehem of our heart. John's message challenges us to consider whether we lead others to Jesus or whether our actions are motivated by a need for attention and affirmation. John's preaching reminds us also of our important task of announcing Christ to others through our lives at home and in the community. When we show real love, kindness, mercy and a spirit of forgiveness we are announcing the truth that Christ is with us. Thus, our lives become a kind of Bible which others can read. John the Baptist invites us to turn this Advent season into a real spiritual homecoming by making the necessary preparations for the arrival of the Savior and his entrance into our lives.
